St Luke Lutheran Church is starting a concert series in support of various community organizations. Sarah will be performing her program, *Cello Trip IV*, which includes Bach's contemplative fourth suite, the premiere of *Cross Channel* by Arizona composer Glenn Stallcop and her own compositions for cello with loop-station, inspired by medieval tunes and renaissance counterpoint with a bit of dramatic Baroque flair. The music is easy, fun, funky, sweet, scratchy, angry, bold, and spacious, with something for everybody to enjoy.

Sarah grew up in the deserts and mountains of Arizona. She studied cello and historical performance practice on viola da gamba at Oberlin Conservatory as well as Baroque cello and violone at the Royal Conservatory in The Hague. Sarah plays a wide range of low and historic stringed instruments from periods ranging from the medieval era to the 21st century: vielle, violas da gamba, violone, Baroque cello, Classical cello, modern cello and modern cello with loop-station. She spends her time in both the Netherlands and in Flagstaff. Donations accepted.

Paul Thornock is Director of Music at Organist at the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist in Savannah, Georgia. He earned the Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Puget Sound where he studied organ with Edward Hansen and conducting with Paul Schultz. He earned the Master of Music in Organ Performance and Literature degree from the University of Notre Dame as a student of Craig Cramer. While at Notre Dame, he was graduate assistant organist at the Basilica of the Sacred Heart under Gail Walton. Thornock earned the Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music as a student of Roberta Gary.

Dr. Thornock has performed for regional conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the 2008 national convention of the Organ Historical Society, the American Institute of Organ Builders, and has been heard as both an organist and conductor on the nationally syndicated radio programs *Pipedreams* and *With Heart and Voice* and was a first place winner in the Strader Organ Playing Competition, in 2012.

WICKS OPUS 1210 PIPE ORGAN FOR SALE

Restored Wicks Op. 1210 Pipe Organ (see [The Diapason Classified](#) for stop lists)



The organ requires a chambered floor-space of 11 feet wide by 14 feet deep with headroom of 11 feet minimum. The walnut finish console requires an additional 5 feet by 5.5 feet floor-space external to the chamber.

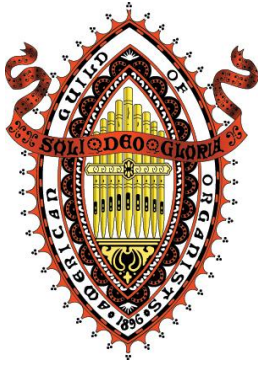
The console has two upper manuals (Great and Swell), lower full pedal, crescendo, and swell control pedals. The organ includes swell shutters for installation into a suitable chamber. The pipe organ is a “unified” instrument, which implies resource “borrowing” to facilitate the various stops that are available. **Price: \$12K**

The Wurlitzer family were German instrument makers dating back to the 17th century with Hans Andreas Wurlitzer, a violin maker. By the 1900s Wurlitzer had factories in DeKalb, Illinois (grand pianos) and North Tonawanda, NY (upright pianos). In 1985 Wurlitzer purchased the Chickering name and all the assets of the Aeolian Corp. Memphis, TN factory. In 1995 Baldwin purchased Wurlitzer and Chickering.



CHURCH MUSIC INSTITUTE AND THE AMERICAN GUILD OF ORGANISTS ANNOUNCE NEW PARTNERSHIP

On June 11, 2019, the [American Guild of Organists](#), by action of the AGO National Council, entered into a partnership with the Church Music Institute to provide discounted CMI membership rates for AGO members. AGO members will have the ability to enjoy CMI member benefits at a discounted rate, which include access to its fully searchable online Sacred Music Library with nearly 19,000 curated choral selections and over 14,000 organ composition titles.

About the Church Music Institute Sacred Music Library

The Church Music Institute contains an extensive Library of sacred choral and organ music for evaluation and study to support the educational purposes of the Institute. The Library is unique in collecting and preserving music for worship and study. Through electronic resources, members find appropriate anthems or organ music to use in worship from the convenience of their home or office.

The choral collection includes an archive of thousands of catalogued sacred octavo anthems for adults and children with additional compositions added daily. Each anthem has been chosen for quality of text, music, and function in worship by the professional staff of CMI. Anthems from every stylistic period from the Renaissance through those most recently published are placed in permanent, acid-free folders for preservation, so that present and future generations may identify, study, and utilize them in worship. Additional choral music contained in the collection includes cantatas and oratorios, service and liturgical music. The library's holdings have been donated to CMI by universities, seminaries, and church music scholars.

The organ collection includes music based on previously existing tunes, including hymn tunes and Gregorian chants. Many works are chorale preludes, while others are re-harmonizations, interludes, and arrangements with other instruments. Sample pages are continuously being added. The collection is being built from libraries that scholarly church organists donated to CMI, online collections in the public domain, and newly published music provided by publishers.

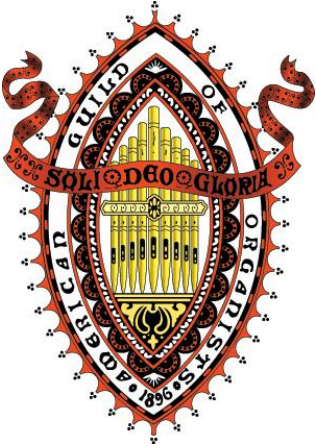
